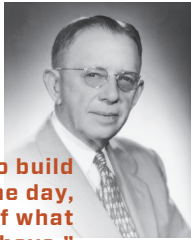

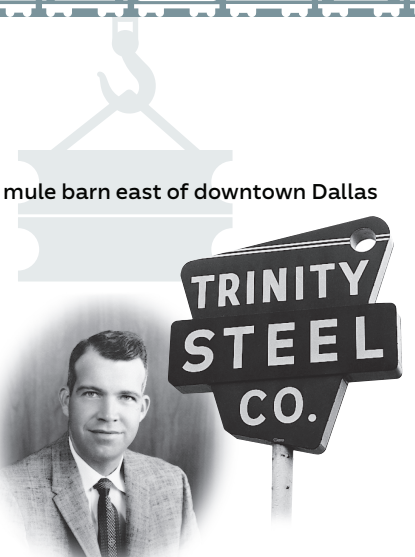
From a Dallas mule barn to a North American Rail Leader (1944–Today)

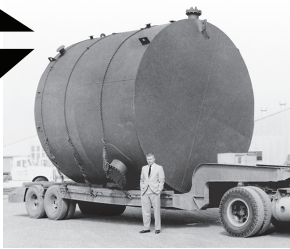
1940s Founded in Dallas

- 1944 C.J. Bender founds Trinity Steel in Dallas, Texas
- Manufactures butane and LPG tanks operating out of a mule barn east of downtown Dallas
- 1946 Bender’s nephew, Ray Wallace, joins the company
- 1948 Incorporates and issues \$100K in stock



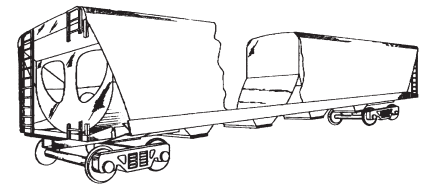
Growth + Merger Challenges 1950s

- 1956 Revenues pass \$3M, products sold in U.S., Canada, Mexico and Europe
- 1958 Trinity Steel merges with Dallas Tank Company and Ray Wallace becomes CEO
 - Merger introduces process, inventory, and chain-of-command challenges
 - Wallace resolves issues through innovation, teamwork and fair leadership



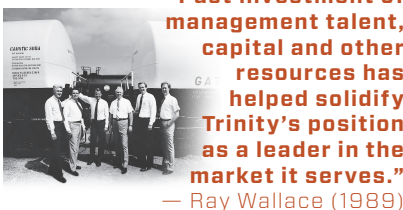
1960s New Name, New Logo, New Scale

- Renamed Trinity Industries and Diamond T logo introduced
- Expands steel-based offerings: barges, wind towers, highway products
- 1966 Builds first tank car
- Manufactures 1,500 jumbo tank cars for LPG and anhydrous ammonia
- Sales grow from \$5M to \$50M



Going Public + Railcar Manufacturing 1970s

- 1972 Commences trading on the NYSE
- 1977 Full-time railcar production begins
 - Starts manufacturing entire tank cars, and develops first hopper car
- 1978 Enters railcar leasing, ends year with 1,000 railcars in Lease portfolio
- Rapid rise as a railcar builder enabled by flexible manufacturing and steel/railcar synergy

1980s Expansion, Fortune 500, Patents

- 1980 Increases production to 7,500+ railcars annually, 46% of revenue from railcars
- 1981 First time ranked in the Fortune 500
- Early-80s recession: Trinity becomes largest railcar manufacturer through acquisitions
- Controls approximately half of industry capacity
- Files 100th U.S. patent application

Global Growth + Billion \$ Railcars 1990s

- 1995 Acquires GRUPO TATSA and expands international operations
- Delivers first higher-capacity covered hopper with a through-sill, rounded design
 - Railcar segment grows into a billion-dollar business
- 1999 Ray Wallace retires and his son, Tim Wallace (with Trinity since 1975), becomes CEO

2000s TrinityRail Brand + Major Scale-Up

- TrinityRail® brand established
- 2001 Acquires Thrall Car Manufacturing, expands product line (esp. autoracks)
- 2007–2008 Scales to manufacturing 27,000+ railcars annually
- 2009 Lease fleet reaches 50,000 railcars (fastest-growing leasing company in N.A.)



Safety, Innovation, Sustainability 2010s

- First Responsible Care certification for commitment to health, safety, and the environment
 - Launches Hourglass® Autorack improving productivity/efficiency/usability
 - 2019 Lease fleet surpasses 100,000 railcars
- 270 railcar designs, 700+ customers, 900+ commodities
- Opens its largest maintenance facility in Shell Rock, Iowa

2020s New CEO, RSI Logistics, ISO

- 2020 Tim Wallace retires after 45 years, and Jean Savage becomes CEO and President
- 2022 First in North American railcar manufacturing to receive ISO 14001 and ISO 45001
- Expands Maintenance services with the addition of regional Mobile Repair capabilities
- 2023 Acquires RSI Logistics (rail shipping logistics software and services) and Holden America
- Receives 2026 Responsible Care Partner of the Year award
